CHC HERITAGE AWARDS NIGHT

On February 19, the community gathered at St Andrew's Heritage Church Hall to honour a number of recipients of this year's community heritage awards.

MAIN STREET TOURS

On Feb 21, as part of Heritage Week, our president Erica Williams led two walking tours of the downtown core. Eighteen people participated in the morning tour with a smaller group in the afternoon.

The focus of the tour was on the historic elements that have been added to the core in recent years, including the sidewalk mosaics, new street signs with old street names, and the "Now and Then" photo panels.

There is now a booklet, available at the museum for \$5, that covers the tour so that people can do their own tour and take visiting friends around.

We hope to add the tour to some existing events, like our "History Goes to Market" outing in May.



MAD HATTER'S TEA PARTY

Sunday, March 22nd was the Mad Hatter's Tea at Haney House Museum. Just over 20 people enjoyed crafts, cookies and the new spring tour. The spring tour, which focuses on "tea and etiquette", will be on display until this summer.

Among the museum's "Top Artifacts" are the Haney family tea cups, which are on display at Haney House Museum. Donated by Anne Haney, granddaughter of Thomas, the Japanese Noritake Porcelain was a family heirloom. The three cups on display in the dining room have a hand-painted design with a dark green rim. Each has a small handle and three small "legs" or "feet" at the bottom of the cup.

Noritake as well as Nippon are brands and products produced or sold by the Morimura Company of Japan. The company saw business potential in the quality of Japanese art and skilled craft that could be adapted to the needs and taste of the North American consumer.

The Morimura company also bought and distributed porcelain blanks to be decorated by independent porcelain decorators in nearby regions. From 1884 Morimura subcontracted decorating firms in Tokyo, Nagoya and Kyoto. The quality of the Early Noritake wares varied with the skill of the individual decorators.

FRANCIS SLEIGH

Members of the Maple Ridge Historical Society were saddened to hear of the death of Francis Sleigh on December 18, 2014, two weeks short of his 90th birthday. He was a former president of the society in the 1970s.

His wife Daphne is one of the researchers and authors of *Maple Ridge – A History of Settlement* which was published in 1972. Francis put his architectural skills to work to create the elegantly drafted district maps for the book, an important feature that helps people understand the layout of early districts within Maple Ridge, their landforms, roads, bridges and buildings.

When Francis saw the plans for building the Haney Bypass, he was horrified to see how it

would cut the heritage area of Port Haney in two, separating Haney House and several other historic buildings by a busy highway. He drew up an alternate route for the needed bypass which would have gone north of Haney House. He led a delegation of society members to protest the initial route at a Council meeting, but to no avail.

Francis Sleigh was as keenly interested in BC history as his wife Daphne. He helped her in many ways in her subsequent historic research and writing about Deroche, Harrison, and most recently the biography of Father Dunstan, *The Artist in the Cloister*.

Our sympathy goes out to Daphne, and her daughters Sarah and Rosemary. *sn*
