HERITAGE TEA ANNOUNCEMENT

After much careful thought and consideration, the Historical Society has decided to cancel the annual Heritage Tea.

The very first tea took place on March 27, 1993 at St. Andrew's United Church. The nostalgic tone was set with a vintage light blue 1947 Mercury car, which was parked outside of the church to welcome guests, while the tea was open to members of the community who had lived in Maple Ridge before 1945. Throughout its 25 year run, the teas provided residents with a chance to see old friends and reminisce about how the community had changed. However, during the past few years due to lower attendance, the rising costs for space and food has made the tea increasingly more expensive to manage. A critical change for this year would be loss of access to the venue's kitchen so all food would have had to be purchased prepared, greatly increasing the cost.

As such, we feel it's important to hit pause and reflect on how to better serve the community. The tea may be reborn in the coming years, in a different capacity, but for now we are saying goodbye to an old friend. We end with a very big thank-you to all of the volunteers and residents who helped make this event such a great success for the past two decades!

FIELD TRIP AND HANEY HOUSE UPDATES

In December staff visited the Roedde House Museum in downtown Vancouver for a guided behind-the-scenes tour of the museum. The late Victorian home was built by famed architect Francis Rattenbury in 1888. The museum operates similar to Haney House, but the tours for visitors and schools are entirely run through a docent program.

Our visit was also a research trip for display cases. Roedde House has custom built-in shelving and storage that fits into not only the era of the home, but into tight spaces. The slanted ceilings upstairs carefully house their temporary gallery, which showcases traveling exhibits. They also have open storage in a few drawers (pictured here), which is a great teaching tool for visitors. We topped off the trip with some tea in the dining room, around the beautiful lit Christmas tree!

At Haney House, during its closure we are trying to capitalize on projects that aren't possible to do when the house is open. Staff have done a complete inventory of all objects on display, and packaged them for the upcoming window renovations, so nothing will be damaged. This month, storage will be tackled.

We are excited to share with you soon the findings from the wallpaper investigation, which is currently being done by Conservator Simone Vogel-Horridge. 2018 is going to bring lots of change to Haney House! *aw*





HERITAGE WEEK – FEB 18-24

Meet by the "Beast" just outside City Hall. The tour will look at the various markers and buildings that tell the story of the early history of this part of the city.

DID YOU KNOW ...?

In the early days of Maple Ridge, January wasn't the slow-paced "recover from the holidays and deal with the weather" sort of time it is now. Down time for farmers couldn't be wasted so municipal elections were held in early January so the new council could be in place and working before spring brought the all-important road and bridge repairs. In the later 1930's, the election was moved back into mid-December so that the new council could be in place for January 1. One year terms meant there was no time to waste.
