CEMETERY CLEAN UP

It is time again for our annual cemetery clean up at the Maple Ridge Cemetery, 21404 Dewdney Trunk Road, July 27th and 28th from 9am-12pm. This volunteer-based project works to preserve headstones at the Maple Ridge Cemetery. Many of the older headstones, belonging to prominent early settlers of the City of Maple Ridge, no longer have individuals to care for them, leaving it up to us and a dedicated band of volunteers to help preserve them. We work at removing grass and accumulated grime from headstones, ensuring that details of our community's historic demographics are remembered. We are currently seeking volunteers for this year's clean up - come help us preserve our shared past and learn cleaning and preservation techniques that you can take to wherever your family members are buried!

NEW STAFF AT THE MUSEUM


SHEA HENRY is our new curator, taking the reins from Allison White in mid may. She comes to us from Mackin Heritage House Museum in Coquitlam and finished her Ph.D. in archaeology at Simon Fraser University in January. Shea has worked in the field of museum studies and historical archaeology for the past 12 years, focusing her research and career on the recent past. She has a strong passion for heritage and community and is very excited to get to know Maple Ridge, its history, and to add to its community through the preservation and sharing of heritage.

ASHLEY SEYMOUR is our new Community Engagement Coordinator, taking over from Alison Pocock. From an early age Ashley has been passionate about studying, preserving, and sharing the past. She was raised by a family of historical reenactors and antique collectors who taught her the value of heritage and the importance of keeping it alive.

Growing up Ashley spent her summers traveling to museums and historical sites, both in her home province of Ontario and abroad. In her teens she became an active volunteer at the Dufferin County Museum and Archives, eventually becoming their youngest employee. While completing her degree in history at the University of Guelph she worked for all five of the regional museums in the surrounding area as an archivist and educator. Ashley's university experience included an exchange to the University of Dundee, Scotland, where she took advantage of the relationship between her two schools and their specializations in Scottish studies. Last December brought with it the completion of her degree, her wedding, and a relocation to BC. In April Ashley attended the Canadian Museum Association conference where she was happy to meet Val and Allison. The rest, as they say, is history, and she is very excited by her new role with the Maple Ridge Museum, and the opportunities it brings to be able to learn, preserve and share our community's history.







CHANGES AT THE MUSEUM GROUNDS

Visitors to the museum site will have noticed that we have sprouted a nice new river-viewing bench located between the main museum building and the caboose. The bench has been placed by the friends and family of local Port Haney resident Gordon Ladd in honour of his 100th birthday.

The other change is the replacement of the wrought-iron fence around the staircase at the back of the brickyard office building. The wrought iron fencing had become wobbly and needed replacing.

Historically, there was no lower level at that building, and so no need for a staircase. There was therefore no historic fence to match. When the buildings were moved out of the way of the bypass, they were put on full-height foundations to increase their usefulness which gave us functional lower levels for both buildings.
