Looking back 100 years we find Raymond Langton Carter leaning against a front porch post at the store in Port Haney that bears his name. The buildings attached to the store could be a stable and hay storage. This entire structure burned down around 1915.

We have long known of R. L. Carter because his name appears on that store in several of our best Port Haney photographs, however, we have never known anything about the family except that they were not related to Nelson Carter who lived further west on River Road. We are now in contact with a family member and hope to flesh out the picture of their time in Maple Ridge.

Charles Whetham built this house in Ruskin in 1894. Simple living and self-sufficiency may have been on his mind when he called it "Walden" after Henry Thoreau's famous cabin in the woods in Massachusetts.

Whetham sold the house to the Gilchrist brothers in 1903, who chose to call it "Kildonan," perhaps after the township on the Isle of Skye.

The ladies in the picture are George Gilchrist's wife Mina and Alex Gilchrist's wife Anna.

At one time the house burned down but no one seems to remember when that happened.
