






#### **AGM & POT LUCK SUPPER**

Feel free to brings friends who might be interested in finding out more about the society. We're a friendly bunch with lots of interesting stories!



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

# OUT OF THE BOX SLOAN'S LINIMENT

Being neither patented, nor medicine, these compounds, tinctures, liniments, and "herbal remedies" called "Patent Medicines", most often contained combinations of alcohol, cocaine, opium, and a strong laxative. This combination gave the impression that it was working by making you feel good, and "expelling the sickness." Their success was all in the advertising and the personalities of the "doctors" who peddled them. One such patent medicine was Sloan's Liniment. This balm was developed by Andrew Sloan, a horse harness making and self-taught veterinarian, in Zanesfield, Ohio in the 1840's. Referred to locally as "Doc Sloan" he would make his special liniment for horses after they had a long ride and needed their sore muscles rejuvenated. The story would have ended there if not for Andrew's son Earl, who left home at 15 to seek his fortune and to take his father's liniment on the road.

Earl Sloan began marketing his father's product not only to livestock ranchers but to people as well. Marketing a product originally, and primarily, intended for livestock to humans may seem like an arduous task, but Sloan was a natural salesman. Intense advertising campaigns combined with the lack of actual doctors in the rural communities Sloan usually visited lead to terrific sales of his product on the road. In reality, the concoction consisted of mostly mineral oil, alcohol, and chili powder, giving the liniment a tingly feeling on the skin, which was enough to convince people that it was working. Eventually, a product mean to ease horses muscles, was being advertised to cure muscle ache, rheumatism, arthritis, stiff neck, bruises, sprains, and if you can believe it, mosquito bites.

The liniment, advertised as "good for man and beast" eventually became a household product meant to cure any muscle, joint, or skin complaint. Amazingly, Sloan's Liniment is still available commercially, advertised specifically for hand pain. It joins products like Bayer aspirin, Vicks Vapo-Rub, coca cola and corn flakes, as a



handful of early patent medicines that are still around today.
