1939 Register

The 1939 Register for England and Wales was taken on September 29, 1939 just after the outbreak of the second world war. It is the only surviving record of the population of England and Wales between 1921 and 1951. The 1931 census was destroyed during an air raid on London and the 1941 census was never taken. It gives the names of the inhabitants at each address, their date of birth, marital status and occupation. The Register is available through www.findmypast.com.

I decided to take a look at it for some members of my family tree. The last time we had seen James Doyle from Waterford, Ireland was in 1904 in Cardiff Police-court. The February 13, 1904 *Evening Express* states that "four Irish seamen—Philip Grant, John Norris, James Doyle and Stephen O'Brien" were charged with stealing a bowl. The charges were dismissed for lack of evidence.

Based on this information I looked for the Doyle family in Cardiff, Wales in the early 1900s. I found a marriage record for James' daughter Margaret Doyle) to Albert Dobbyn. I decided to look for them in the 1939 Register. I found them with

daughter Agnes. Agnes is a munition worker. The 1939 Register used for the National Register so it was updated up until at least 1952. Dobbyn is crossed out in blue ink and Sharp is written in. I found a marriage record and discover that Agnes Dobbyn married William Sharp in 1943. Four other records are closed —records of people younger than 100 and still alive, or who died after 1991 are officially closed. Agnes was born in 1920 so her record being open means that she died before 1991.

I also found a widowed James Doyle living in a common lodging house on Bute Street. Findmypast provides a map of the address using a map. You can switch between a modern map, 188-1913 ordnance survey map, and a 1937-1961 ordnance survey map. His occupation is listed as a retired fireman.

The 1939 Register does not provide as much information as we are used to with the 1911 census but it certainly a useful resource when researching our more recent ancestors.
