Reading Scotland's Records

Recently I was made aware of a free "Early Modern Scottish Paleography, Reading Scotland's Records" course from *FutureLearn*. It promised a three-week course with each week only requiring about three hours to complete. As this would give me insight in deciphering handwriting hieroglyphics and the time required was manageable I decided to try it. I have not been disappointed.

The course, offered through the University of Glasgow, was broken into many easy sections. It was a mix of Scottish history, church development through the time period in question, as well as the political situations all of which contributed to the writings in question. The course instructors, Scott Spurlock, from Scottish Religious Cultures, and, Neil McIntyre, research assistant from the School Of Critical Studies created a good background for the course. The articles were concise yet deeply detailed and gave context for the content. These were mixed with the informative and delightful lectures of Doctor Lionel Glassey that specifically pertained to recognizing handwriting idiosyncrasies. Fortunately, many examples were shown to help the participant recognize what was being demonstrated.

The quizzes were multiple choice, usually needing more than one answer and only on the actual handwriting examples. Many Scottish sources were given as well as specific websites. Subjects such as capitals, currency, numbers, abbreviations, and contractions were covered. Even a link to a Scottish Dictionary, almost 100 years in the making, was given as well as a link to a Scottish handwriting website.

Whereas I previously thought certain marks on the paper were accidental, I will now look at them with a different eye. I will be mindful of date changes due to the method of dating or whether the Julian calendar was being used instead of the Georgian calendar — it turns out my birthday was considered New Year's Eve! I will even consider whether the pound spoken about was Scottish pound or pound Sterling.

Reading the comments from other participants was enlightening. Concepts or history I was not aware of were talked about from individuals around the globe. Many taking this course were genealogy oriented.

I took the free version at this time so my ability to access the course expires after about seven weeks but the paid version gets you unlimited access to the course until the website ends, with a certificate at the end for your records.

FutureLearn gave me good background information, plenty of websites to learn more about my ancestral country and fun practice on deciphering early handwriting. I would recommend it to anyone wanting to learn how to read old documents whether Scottish or not.
