The Last Post Fund, Unmarked Grave Program

In the spring of 2016 the Maple Ridge Family History Group received an email inquiry from England from the great niece and nephew of Frederick and Albert Sykes, looking for information about their lives in Canada. The Sykes brothers had immigrated to Canada in 1910 and settled in Maple Ridge. They enlisted together on November 6, 1916, serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force in England and France during World War I, in the Canadian Forestry Corp, 230th Battalion. They returned to Canada in 1919. Frederick lived in Maple Ridge until his death in 1948; his English war bride wife returned to England a few years later. Albert and his wife (who had been raised in Webster's Corners) moved to Little Fort. He died in Kamloops in 1952 and is buried there in Hillside Cemetery; his wife moved from the area.

I was saddened to discover that both brothers lay in unmarked graves, and gave some thought as to how to remedy the situation, but could come to no viable solution.

Then, last year, in the week leading up to Remembrance Day, I read an article in *The Vancouver Sun*. The article mentioned the Last Post Fund, Unmarked Grave Program. I quickly went to their website www.lastpostfund.ca

The Last Post Fund was created in April 1909, championed by Arthur Hair, a veteran of the South African War, who worked as an orderly at the Montreal general hospital. When a homeless man was brought to the hospital and subsequently died, his remains would have been turned over to science for medical research as was the practise. Hair had ascertained the man was a veteran of the same war and was dismayed that a veteran would be treated this way. He set about raising money from friends and colleagues to give the soldier a decent and dignified funeral.

In 1996 the Last Post Fund created the "Unmarked Grave Program" with the objective of providing a military-style marker for eligible veterans who lie in unmarked graves.

I telephoned the Last Post Fund in Montreal and spoke with one of their Counsellors, Kelly Martin, briefly describing the background of the Sykes brothers. It appeared they met the criteria for grave markers. I completed and returned the Preliminary Information application form together with their British Columbia Death Registrations. Their military personnel files were soon to be digitized by Library and Archives Canada and available on LAC's website.

This spring a marker was installed for Frederick Sykes at Maple Ridge Cemetery.

If this were the end of the story it would be a happy ending. But there's more!

ALLCO Infirmary, the provincial hospital which operated in Maple Ridge for more than three decades, was the last home to hundreds of men in poor health and without family to care for them. It occurred to me that some of the residents would surely be veterans of the First World War. I contacted Sandra Ayers, who is working on a cemetery project of her own, and asked whether she could isolate the ALLCO residents in her database. She very quickly emailed a list of the men buried in Maple Ridge Cemetery together with their birth and death dates.

Looking into hundreds of names appeared a daunting task. I decided to narrow the search by birth year, surmising the servicemen would have been born between 1880 and 1899. To capture anyone older or younger than I expected, I looked at men with birth years from 1875 to 1905. I checked the LAC database for attestation documents, then downloaded the death registrations from BC Archives http://search-collections.royalbcmuseum.bc.ca/Genealogy for those men who had served.

I submitted applications for 12 men who were veterans of the Canadian Expeditionary Force during World War I. All have been approved and grave markers have been installed at Maple Ridge Cemetery for all but the name beginning with the letter "W" – LAC has only recently finished digitizing all the WWI military personnel records.
