Dewdney Trunk Road — A Long Time A-Coming

To explore the collection of British Columbia Sessional Papers I chose a local landmark to link early references to road building in Maple Ridge.

According to the introduction to this record on the University of British Columbia Open Library site:

The British Columbia Sessional Papers are an annual collection of selected papers tabled in the Legislative Council of British Columbia (2nd to 8th Sessions, 1865-1871) and the Legislative Assembly (1st to 32nd Parliaments, 1872-1982).

The British Columbia Sessional Papers contain materials that document the political, historical, economic and cultural history of British Columbia. The Sessional Papers include official committee reports, orders of the day, petitions and papers presented, records of land sales, correspondence, budgetary estimates, proclamations, maps, voters lists by district, and departmental annual reports

I first became interested in road building in our community during the Pope Project undertaken by the Maple Ridge Family History Group. A petition signed by landowners of Township 12 was dated 1877. The request in this case was for River Road.

In the BC Sessional Papers, early references to Dewdney Trunk Road can be found in the Minister of Public Works report for 1900-1901. The follow is the most comprehensive description of the whole project found so far.

DEWDNEY DISTRICT.

Dewdney Trunk Road: This road was begun many years ago for the purpose of giving the settlers on the north side of the Fraser a through road, starting from New Westminster and vicinity and going as far east as the settlement at Agassiz. For the better administration

For the better administration of work this road has been divided into sections. On the first three sections traffic is very heavy. A brief account of work done on section is here given:--



Maple Ridge and unincorporated Pitt Meadows were represented by three sections. Section 3 ran from Pitt River to Laity's with one mile surfaced and graveled. Section 4 carried travelers from Laity's to Webster's Corners, and Section 4, still under construction, extended to the Power Company Dam on the Stave River. The Family History Department will be moving back to Cloverdale branch and reopening on Monday, March 9!


The Family History department will not be available AT ALL between February 23 and March 9, 2020.

The Guinness Archive

Did your ancestor work for Guiness? The Guinness collection of personnel files of past employees includes records relating to more than 20,000 past employees from the early 1880s onwards, the date when the Guinness Company first introduced their pension scheme to all employees. You can search the database from their website but access to the original personnel files is available to direct family members in person.

The files hold details such as an employee's date of birth, details of education/ employment prior to entering the brewery, position(s) held in the Brewery, wages earned, payment of pension, and where applicable, payment of pension to the employee's widow on his death.

If you are in Dublin, the Guinness Archive is open by appointment on Monday to Friday from 9:30am-5:00pm.

The Provincial Archives of New Brunswick has released 11,017 civil birth records for 1924 and made an index for them available online.

The index provides a transcription of the name of the child, sex, date and location of birth, and parents' names.

Each entry has a transcript, with first name(s), last name, birth date, death date, cemetery, city, county and includes a link to an image of the headstone with GPS details.

U.S. WWII Draft Cards Young Men. 1940-1947

36 million United States, Second World War draft cards. "This database contains images and indexes for registration cards filled out by men born between the years of 1898 and 1929 from for all states with the exception of Maine. The draft cards from the state of Maine were destroyed before they could be digitized."

Details that can include: name, serial number, address and/or mailing address, telephone, age, place of birth, country of citizenship, employer's name, place of employment, and physical description.

MyHeritage has released a new collection of 545 million records from 25,000 historical US City Directories.

"The collection was produced exclusively by *MyHeritage* from 25,000 public U.S. city directories published between 1860 and 1960. It comprises 545 million aggregated records that have been consolidated from 1.3 billion records, many of which included similar entries for the same individual. This addition brings the total number of historical records on *MyHeritage* to 11.9 billion records.

Rootsweb E-mail Lists From Diane M. Rogers

Ancestry-Rootsweb announced recently that the thousands of Rootsweb e-mail lists will be discontinued as of 1 March 1, 2020. The volunteer administrators have found new homes for most. Some are now at groups.io which welcomed us. Some lists are now Facebook or Google groups.

If you were an old list member, you likely received an invitation to join the new list. Or to find a new list, usually you can Google (or Bing or DuckDuckGo) using the old list name and Rootsweb as search terms, e.g. YORKSGEN and Rootsweb. Or check the Ancestry-Rootsweb list archives as most admins posted a notice on the old list. A few lists have merged.

Ancestry-Rootsweb has promised to keep the list archives online (and the message boards active).


