Community History Project

This year's community history project began with a desire to highlight the people typically left out of historical narratives. We started by transcribing the 1891 census for Maple Ridge. We noted that there were a vast number of people who listed fishing as their occupation so we selected two families to focus on: the Chiers (or Cheers) and the Nelsons. Work is now continuing on digging through the census, vitals, directories, and newspapers.

I took a look for images in the Maple Ridge Museum & Archives collection to accompany our project and found image P0034.

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Ideas to Keep Busy

Research Wiki

Family Search's Research Wiki, found under the Search tab. Watch tutorials on how to research in a specific country or area, learn about research tools, learn about the geography of the area, link to other online genealogical sites for the country.

Indexing www.familysearch.org/indexing/

Consider becoming a Family Search Indexer. Isn't it great entering your ancestor's name, and perhaps a few details, into the search function and getting a result? This is possible because volunteers have indexed documents. Indexing makes records searchable.

Indexers extract specific information from images of birth, marriage and death records, censuses, draft cards, pension records and so much more...and type that info into the web-based Family Search forms. Documents are in English and many other languages. You select the language and type of document you want to index. Tutorials, guidelines and helps are available as you work your way through batches. You may be helping to make the very records you're looking for searchable. Click on the Indexing tab in Family Search and get started.

1851 Census of Canada

The 1851 census of Canada was originally indexed and published by FamilySearch in 2008 but is now being reindexed to allow linking of each entry to an image of the original census, a feature not allowed at the first instance due to contractual obligations. This new indexing effort will allow the grouping of individuals into family groups as they appear in the census, as well as including marital status. This additional information will make the index more robust. thereby increasing its facility for identifying ancestors.

Upper Canada (Ontario) is the first province to be indexed, followed by Lower Canada (Quebec). The original enumeration forms for both are almost identical, while those of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia recorded less information. Both these indexing projects will be launched separately on FamilySearch Indexing when Ontario and Quebec are completed. Of course, in 1851 these four colonies comprised all the British colonies in North America, sixteen years before Confederation. It should be noted that although these census enumerations were initiated in 1851, much of them were conducted in 1852, and the geographical limits of the colonies roughly correspond but are not exact with the post Confederation provincial boundaries.

What does this mean?

Family History department staff members will be able to pop into the branch and do specific lookups for you, using ANY of our resources – all of our databases, microfilms and print collection (see below for links), and send you an email report and a scan (if item is found) of your results. For free.

What are the parameters?

Limit of one question per person per day.

Questions need to be specific. Here are some examples of what we mean by that:

- "I'm looking for a birth registration for my greatgrandmother Sadie Ellen Higgs. I believe she was born in Kent, England around 1891 but I haven't been able to find a record. Can you please check your databases?"
- "I have a BC Archives death record registration number but the record image is not available online. Can you please check the microfilm?"
- "Do you have a local history book for Red Cliff, Alberta, and, if so, could you please

check to see if my family is in there? The surname is Jarvis."

 "My grandparents were divorced in BC around 1947. Can you check your BC Divorce Orders Index microfilm to get a reference so I can order the document? Their names were Jonathan Grady and Martha nee Sunderland."

Not sure? Send your question anyway and we'll help/direct you as best we can.
