

FINNISH DRESS

We recently had a very generous and exciting donation to the museum of a traditional Finnish Family dress. This dress was in the donor's family for generations, and has quite a long history. The dress was purchased in 1920 by Ada Piikki in the marketplace of Kuopio, Finland. Ada was one of 10 children working hard at the family farm for their stern father. By 1930 when she was a young woman she decided to immigrate to Canada. She left for Toronto, dress in hand, and found work as a maid. In 1932 she met and married Walter Rauma and after having their first child, a daughter Eila, and suffering through the great depression they moved to Websters Corners with its thriving Finnish community. Eila and her siblings grew up on a 5 acre plot Walter cleared by hand to build their family home. Eventually as a young woman, Ada passed her traditional Finnish dress on to Eila, who wore it to functions at the Finnish community's Sampo Hall. Eila would go on to marry Derek Male and have daughters she would pass the dress on to. After generations in the family, those daughters have now donated the dress to the museum, 100 years after it was purchased in a small market town in Finland.

The Finnish community and culture are a large and important part of the heritage story of Maple Ridge, and this dress now adds to our museum's ability to tell that story. It joins other historic and heritage clothing in our collection from the elaborate Victorian and Edwardian clothes worn by the European settlers to the beautifully crafted silk Kimono's worn by the Japanese settlers. Each tells an important story of their origins and the families who wore them, and they all collectively tell the story of Maple Ridge.

To add still further to the significance of the gift, Eila Male was a steadfast volunteer for our museum doing tours, working at the Heritage Tea and doing Finnish translations for us. She made sure we spelled all of those difficult names correctly. This dress was important to her and she was important to us. This gift will help us keep her memory alive.





STUDENTS WORK OVER SUMMER:

We were very lucky once again this year to be joined by three great student workers over the summer! In this strange summer of social distancing and worker cohorts our students did a great job adapting to a new way of working.

It might have been a quiet and sometimes lonely summer of everyone working in different areas of the museum, but we were able to accomplish several necessary projects.

Students actively worked on and completed, artifact photos, a digital online tour of the museum, archival digitizing, and each put together museum exhibits.
