Port Haney Brick & Tile Company

The Haney Brick & Tile company was a very successful business and it was the biggest brick company in Maple Ridge. The bricks and tiles would be sold and shipped as far away as Victoria for use in building construction. The brickyard employed up to 90 people at once, from many cultural backgrounds (especially immigrants from India and China), but as technology advanced, the labour force was reduced. The introduction of machines into the industries automated a lot of the work, which required less people. It also took away many very physical demanding jobs and made work much easier. For example, Haney Brick & Tile got their first excavator in 1929. Prior to that, all of the clay had to be dug and moved by hand like in the photo to the right.

When you think about the major industries in the pioneer days of the Lower Mainland, what comes to mind? Farming, forestry, transportation are often the top three! Did you know though that Maple Ridge had a major brick making industry as well? Many Europeans who moved to the area in the late 1800s and early 1900s discovered that the rich clay deposits along the river and the easy access to transportation (by river or rail) could yield a prosperous business in making and selling bricks. Many small brick-making operations had existed in Haney for years, but the founders of the Port Haney Brick & Tile Company started up their business in 1907. Over 70 years of operation, this company had only 3 different managers: Mr. Burnet, Mr. Hadgkiss, and Mr. Findlay. These men, along with their families, lived in the Manager's House while they were in service of the company. Today, this house is the Maple Ridge Museum and it sits beside the old Brickvard office and "Jim Hadgkiss Park".
