Ancestry Library Edition at Maple Ridge Public Library

The Fraser Valley Regional Library now has Ancestry Library Edition on their website. Ancestry Library Edition "is a searchable database of genealogical resources including U.S., U.K. and Canadian census returns, vital statistics, parish records, military records, court records, ships' passenger lists, directories, family trees, periodicals, local histories, maps and forms. Some records include digitized images."

These records are for in library use only. When you go to the library log on to the library website and click on Online Resources. Scroll down to Databases for in Library Use and you will find Ancestry Library Edition. Click on the link and it will take you directly to the databases at Ancestry.

Once you log onto to a terminal at the library you have an hour to use the computer. Make sure you check because some terminals are limited to 15 minutes only. These are used mainly for the card catalogue.

If you find information on your family you can print off copies of the document and any supporting information. It will cost you 15 cents per page. You

are not able to download the images onto a flash drive or any similar device. The library computers do not have the capability for downloads except on the computers used for word processing.

The British Colonist: A New Site for Exploring BC History

Read the daily news from 1858. Explore the beginnings of the new colony. Find out what life was like during the Cariboo Gold Rush. First hand—as history was being made.

Dave Obee, Managing Editor of the Times Colonist newspaper, and John Lutz, Associate Professor in History at the University of Victoria, have stickhandled the debut of this newest source of Canadian newspapers for local and family historians— The British Colonist.

From the web site, which arrived in the world on 11 December 2008:

On December 11th, 1858, in the midst of a gold rush, a man with the improbable name Amor de Cosmos inked up an old hand press and launched a newspaper - the British Colonist -- into the world. Published in Victoria, it became the leading paper in the colonies of Vancouver Island and British Columbia, and was the paper for the province of British Columbia until the emergence of Vancouver and competitors in the 1890s.

"In every thing that concerns
British Columbia we shall take a
deep and permanent interest"
said de Cosmos, the "Lover of the
Universe", and so the paper did.
From the extraordinary
discoveries of gold and outbreaks
of war, to the mundane shipping
news and advertisements for
insomnia cures, so much of the
history of British Columbia and
its people, exists only in the
pages of this remarkable
publication.

This website contains all the issues of the British Colonist (also called The Daily British Colonist, the Daily Colonist, and other variants) from its first issue in 1858 to June of 1910. Once trapped between its crumbling covers, the chronicle of Victoria and British Columbia is now available at the click of a mouse.

You can browse by date or use the search feature to mine the contents of the paper. The search feature is, however, only as good as the 60 year old microfilm, so even the best software had a hard time reading this old paper. Searching any given term will certainly miss some instances and insert others, so you may also want to refer to the index to the paper on Victoria's Victoria.
