

Maple Ridge 150

Maple Ridge 150 series, our story part 5 of 6.

Our story continues with the incorporation of Maple Ridge as a municipality. On September 12th, 1874 a group of men who were early settlers to the Maple Ridge area gathered on the farm of John McIver to sign the letters patent to form a municipality. Letters patent is a type of legal document that confers rights and status, and contains a description of the new municipalities borders. At the time, local approval for incorporation considered only the opinions of "at least two-thirds of the male freeholders, householders, free miners, pre-emptors, and leaseholders, for the term of

not less than two years. This explicitly excluded the Indigenous peoples whose land this is, women, renters, and all non-white ethnic groups whose ability to own property was restricted under the law.

The letters patent were quickly published in the British Columbia gazette, a public record for government matters, printed in Victoria. The new municipality was described in the BC Gazette as "all that piece of land including within the lines commencing at a point on the right bank of the Fraser River at its junction with Pitt River; thence running Eastwardly following the bank of the Fraser River for the distance of fourteen and three-quarter miles; thence Northerly for a distance of six and three-quarter miles; thence Westerly a distance of fourteen and three-quarter miles; thence Southwardly to point of commencement..." This includes what is today Pitt Meadows, who would split off in 1896, and then incorporate in 1914. It also notably includes a small portion of today's Port Coquitlam. This initial boundary marking would be settled when Coquitlam (1891) and then Port Coquitlam (1913) became their own municipalities. This description also does not include (or exclude) the Katzie Reserve lands which were defined in the 1860's.


Maple Ridge was the sixth municipality incorporated in British Columbia and was beaten by New Westminster in 1860, Victoria in 1862, Chilliwack and the Township of Langley on the same day in April 1873 and North Cowichan in June 1873. With the municipality incorporated the newly elected councillors could appeal to the government in Victoria for funds to build roads and bridges which were desperately desired from the settlers to get their goods to and from their farms away from the river. Our next installment will conclude our early history series with how the municipality moved forward over the next 150 years.

Maple Ridge 150 Celebrations




St Andrews Church Hall Rental


