Maple Ridge 150

Maple Ridge 150 series, our story part 6 of 6.



After the City of Maple Ridge Was incorporated on September 14, 1874, the municipality, neighbourhoods, towns, and eventually a city has continuously grown since. While Maple Ridge was the original settler name for the area, its use was almost entirely bureaucratic until recent years. What began as Maple Ridge soon developed into seven historic neighbourhoods which took on identities and cultures of their own. Five of these neighbourhoods were along the new CPR line and two were the results of the roads built from tax collection after incorporation.

Hammond, which began as Port Hammond, is named after the Hammond Brothers who were the first preemptors of the area. The town would eventually grow into a company town for the Hammond Cedar Mill. Though the mill now closed, Hammond contains the highest number of historic houses and buildings left in Maple Ridge. Haney, also known as Port Haney, would become the commerce centre of Maple Ridge in the early years and would in the later 20th century become downtown to the growing Maple Ridge population. After the building of Lougheed Highway in 1931 and a devastating fire in Port Haney, the centre of town moved, and remains, along Lougheed highway and 224th street. Albion was the first area settled by settlers from Fort Langley, the first being Maillot PeoPeoh a Hawaiian Kanaka employee of HBC. This neighbourhood was settled over the years by farmers and became berry and fruit farms for people from all over the world. Whonnock, which remains a rural area of Maple Ridge was settled largely by Norwegian and Japanese farmers. Ruskin, CPR stop furthest east, was founded as a socialist commune following the teachings of environmentalist and socialist John Ruskin. While this commune only lasted a few years it quickly became a logging operation. Logging and farming were the main industries of the area and it today also remains a rural area of Maple Ridge. Moving away from the train line is Websters Corners. This community also began as a socialist community founded by Finnish settlers from Sointula. This commune also only lasted a few years but from it sprang a thriving and vibrant Finnish community. Many of the descendants of the Finnish settlers still live in Websters Corners today. And finally, Yannadon is home to much of the environmental beauty of Maple Ridge. The UBC research forest would be founded out of the Marc Family land and Golden Ears Park, Maple Ridge Park, and Davidson Pool have become iconic to the Maple Ridge experience. These neighbourhoods still make up the fabric of modern day Maple Ridge.

As we think about our 150 years of settler history we consider what legacy we are leaving to the future. Our past contains moments to be proud of, moments to be sad about, and moments to be ashamed of. Each are valuable and each have a lesson to teach us. We hope to continue to tell these stories for the community for the next 150 years.

We attended Our Neck of the Woods, which celebrated 150 years since the incorporation of Maple Ridge as a municipality, with displays, trivia, and giveaways. Maple Ridge's annual Tree Planting event was held right here in Jim Hadgkiss Park on a very rainy Wednesday; nine new trees were planted. We ended September with National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, educating the public about the museum's role as an archaeological repository, and what to do if they found archaeological materials on their property.

October was also busy, with our annual Culture Days offering of Apple Harvest Festival at Haney House.
