Learning Outcomes


This activity is recommended for students in kindergarten to grade 3; younger students may need more help and activities can be modified as needed. This activity connects to Social studies and Science BC curriculum competencies, such as biodiversity in the local environment. The learning outcomes and skills developed for this worksheet are:

- Local wildlife
- Wildlife identification
- Local habitats
- Names of local animals
- How local animals behave in their environments

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Maple Ridge Wildlife

Many species of wildlife call Maple Ridge home. Some you might only see while going on walks in parks, while others you might see hanging around your home. Below you will find some common examples of the local wildlife with introductions so you can get to know them better.



WOLF

You'll find me in: any habitat, but preferably a remote one.

My favorite foods are: medium to large mammals.

Most unique feature: my howl.

Fun fact: Dogs are the descendants of an extinct wolf species.



DEER

You'll find me in: the forest or grassy areas.

My favorite foods are: grass, nuts and other plants.

Most unique feature: my graceful jump.

Fun fact: Female deer are called does, and males are called bucks.



CANADA GOOSE

You'll find me in: aquatic habitats.

My favorite foods are: grass and grains.

Most unique feature: my honking noise,

Fun fact: I love Canada, but for winter I fly South for warmer weather.



COYOTE

You'll find me in: open or semi-wooded areas, or your neighborhood.

My favorite foods are: anything!

Most unique feature: my narrow pointed face.

Fun fact: As a canine, I'm related to dogs and wolves.



BLUE HERON

You'll find me in: marshes and wetlands.

My favorite foods are: fish.

Most unique feature: my long legs and neck.

Fun fact: When I'm flying I hold my neck in an S shape with my legs dangling behind me.



SQUIRREL

You'll find me in: backyards and forests.

My favorite foods are: fungi, seeds and even some insects.

Most unique feature: my big bushy tail.

Fun fact: I can find food buried under a foot of snow thanks to my sense of smell.

RABBIT

You'll find me in: most areas, but grasslands especially.

My favorite foods are: weeds, grass, wildflowers and twigs.

Most unique feature: my long ears.

Fun fact: My vision covers almost a full 360 degrees.



CROW

You'll find me in: open areas such as farms or urban areas.

My favorite foods are: anything!

Most unique feature: my black iridescent feathers.

Fun fact: It's best not to anger me because I have an excellent memory and can hold a grudge.



MOUSE

You'll find me in: forests, grasslands, and buildings.

My favorite foods are: fruits, seeds, and sometimes meat.

Most unique feature: is how tiny I am.

Fun fact: As a rodent, I'm related to squirrels, raccoons, and beavers.



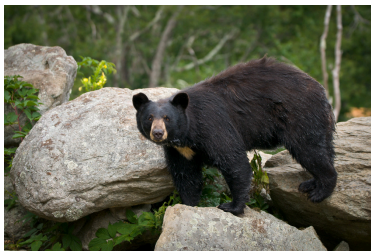
BEAVER

You'll find me in: forest and urban areas.

My favorite foods are: everything!

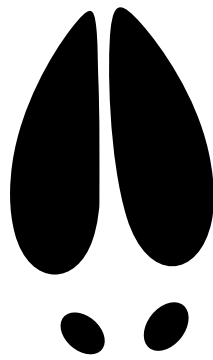
Most unique feature: my black markings AKA my bandit mask.

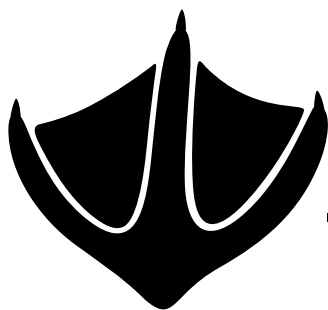

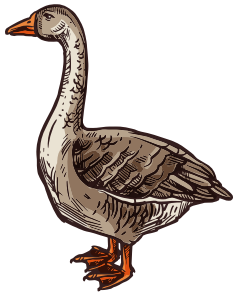

What's Their Diet?

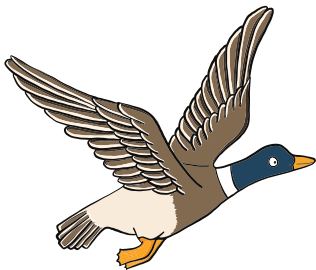
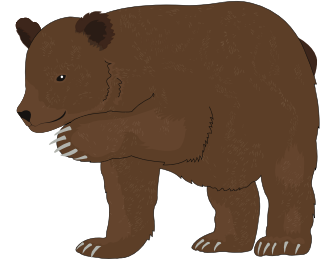
Draw lines between each animal and their diet type

Animals who eat meat



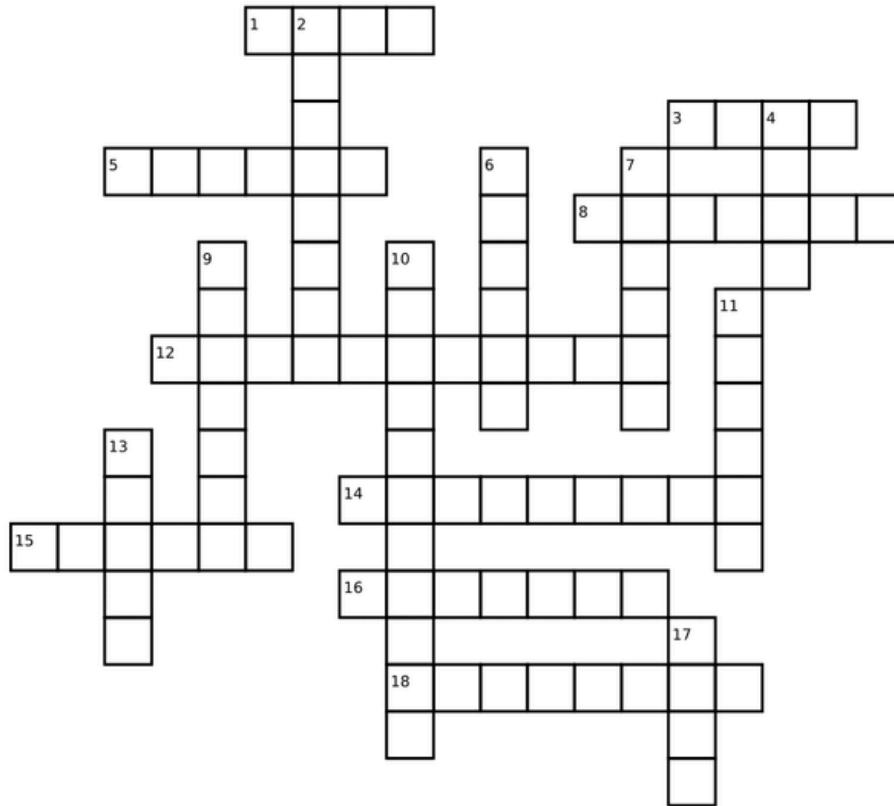
OMNIVORE
