We are saddened to say that we have lost a champion, giant, and friend in Val Patenaude. Val passed away on May 16th after a short illness. Her loss has come as a shock to us at the Historical Society and Museum. Val began working at the Maple Ridge Museum in 1991 as its first paid employee. Taking on the reigns from Sheila Nickols, her long time friend and mentor, Val dove in head first. She brought with her a love of history and local heritage through her work as an archaeologist in the local area. Through the years she gained the respect of the community and all of those she worked with. Her legacy is particularly felt here at the museum through all of the students, volunteers, and young employees whom she mentored. When she retired she had worked at the museum for 27 years, bringing it from a small volunteer run museum to a registered charity not-for-profit and treasured community partner. She was always humbly there with her enormous wealth of knowledge and was always happy to share it. "When I stepped into Val's shoes as executive director of the museum I knew going in that they were enormously large and I would never be able to fit them. Five years into the position that remains the case. Val Patenaude gave her passion and wisdom to the Maple Ridge Museum & Archives for 27 years and her legacy here is felt each and every day. Val was the heart, soul, and knowledge keeper of this place, though she would deny it. She was forever humble about her depth of knowledge and the sheer accomplishments that she achieved in her time leading the museum. She brought this organization from a single volunteer run local museum to a thriving charity not for profit that is a fixture of the community. She was always straightforward, honest, and endlessly generous with her knowledge and skills. I worked for Val for several years before taking on her position when she retired. Working for Val was a privilege, and I will never forget the lessons she taught me. I always admired how strong she was and how easy it seemed for her to stand up to people and stand up for heritage.

She was my mentor, my teacher, and my friend and I will miss her very much." - Shea

June started off with our monthly walking tours. We had our first Headstone Preservation


Project session, working in the second section of Maple Ridge Cemetery. We went to Pride in the
