

OUR HISTORY IN POWER

In the earliest days of exploration in the Ruskin area of Maple Ridge, two resources stood out – the massive trees and the equally massive potential for power production on the Stave River. Development of a generator that could work with hydraulic power sources had occurred in the 1870s. The first generating plant was built in Britain in 1878 with others soon to follow in the US and Canada. So from the earliest days of settlement, the lower Stave stood out as having a regional power source potential.

It wasn't until 1911 that the means to get the necessary supplies to the dam site was developed by the Western Canada Power Company. They constructed the world's shortest chartered railway to take men and materials from Ruskin to the site of the first dam on the outlet of Stave Lake. Writing in 1912, consulting engineer John R. Freeman reported to the Canadian licensing bureau that the Stave dam was a most excellent construction and that its "imperishable character" would require little maintenance.

Freeman had also examined the "Lower Site" which was 4 miles downstream, leaving enough room for an "equalizing reservoir" or, as we know it, "Hayward Lake". Hayward Lake was named after the first chief engineer and general manager R. F. Hayward who was with the project from 1910.

Before the Ruskin Plant could be built, however, the game changed when the young BC Electric Company acquired the assets of the American "Western Canada Power Company." Rather than develop a dam and power house of their own at Alouette, the new plan was to tunnel between Alouette and Stave Lake with a power house at the Stave end of the tunnel to take advantage of the 43m drop between the lakes. The Alouette dam and tunnel were completed by 1926 and the company moved on to construct the Ruskin Dam and powerhouse, creating Alouette and Hayward Lakes and three opportunities to generate power from the same water.

This year's Heritage Canada theme is "The Heritage of Power," so all across the country Canadians will be learning more about how we have kept the lights on over the last 100 years or so. The Maple Ridge Museum has a large display in the library foyer cases about our dams and the people who built them. —Val Patenaude

WE CALL IT HANEY!!




The Haney Facebook group continues to grow and now stands at 1225 members. Its members are enthusiastically sharing memories and old school photos. They are
