MUSSALLEM GIFT

We were delighted, in July, to receive a very generous donation from the Mussallem family of a set of uniforms and military paraphernalia Helen Mussallem used during World War Two. Helen Mussallem, daughter of former mayor Solomon Mussallem, was one of the most decorated individuals of Maple Ridge. She was coincidentally also a feature of our Summer Student Jessica Hyde's research and library display on the amazing women of Maple Ridge's past.

Helen decided at the age of 19 that she wanted to be a nurse and she pursued that dream by attending the school of nursing at Vancouver General Hospital (VGH) in 1934. She continued to work at VGH until WWII, and in 1943 she enlisted, becoming a lieutenant in the No.19 Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps. She was deployed to the United Kingdom not long afterwards where she was in charge of operating rooms. She then went on to work in field hospitals in France and Germany. Unlike most of the female officers in WWII, Helen Mussallem was often under fire. For her service during WWII, she earned 9 medals which made her Canada's most decorated nurse to serve in the armed forces during WWII. She was discharged from active duty in 1946 after which she continued her education at McGill

University and became the first Canadian nurse to receive a doctoral degree in nursing education.

Helen was incredibly active for the entirety of her life. Among her many accomplishments, she is partially responsible for the reformation of nursing education, the unionization of nurses in Canada, the transformation of nursing into a career (instead of a vocation) by improving and standardizing nursing education in Canada and the establishment of the National Nursing Library which was later renamed after her. She earned many awards for her work in the field of nursing, the most notable of which were the Florence Nightingale Medal (the highest award that can be awarded by the International Red Cross), a Damehood of Grace (Order of St. John) and an officership of the Order of Canada.

Part of the collection donated to us by the Mussallem family in July was Helen's WWII nursing and army uniform along with some of her medals, canteen, nursing equipment and photos. We are so excited to have this piece of Maple Ridge's history and a glimpse of the life of this incredible person.

Speaking of Art and History is our bi-annual speaker's series highlighting local artists and their use of heritage in their art. Our October speaker is Gerry Sheena.

Gerry Sheena is one of three new artists in residence for the City of Maple Ridge. Gerry is a Coast Salish carver who has been a full-time artist for the past 30 years.

He is coming from an artist residency for the Collingwood Neighborhood House in Vancouver, where he raised a 20-foot red cedar totem pole named "Ancient Cedars Journey Home." The totem pole was carved outside of the community center with the help of three youth apprentice carvers over ten weeks.

As part of his residency he plans to provide painting, designing, and carving workshops and to continue his work of designing and carving large sculptures.

At Speaking of Art and History Gerry will be talking about his work as an artist and his connection between his art and heritage.
